Welcome to Week 2 of our Story of the Bible class.

Optional Reading

- 1) Read or listen to an audio recording of Exodus 1–20
- 2) Read or listen to an audio recording of Deuteronomy 4–11 (look for all the creation imagery!)
- 3) Spend time specifically with Exodus 15. The song is one of the oldest Israelite songs we know of! Then read Psalm 78, 106, 107.
 - a) How do the songs highlight different parts of the Exodus story?
 - b) How do the songs point to the character of God?
- 4) Read Leviticus 19.
 - a) Notice the clause repeated the most in this chapter. Put into your own words what the purpose of the Israelite laws are.
 - b) Take specific note of verse 34 and read that with the next verses from Deuteronomy.
- 5) Read Deuteronomy 6:4–5 is called the *Shema*. That comes from the first word of the verses "Hear!" And this means "hear and do" not simple listen to the sound waves. This statement is considered to be THE central affirmation of faith for the Israelites and Jews of modern day.
 - a) Leviticus 19:34 and Deuteronomy 6:5 have interesting parallels to each other in the Hebrew. They were both considered to be the most important part of Israelite faith in God. When later generations asked, "what is the greatest commandment?" the answer was one or both of these statements. Do you hear this in any of the teachings of Jesus?
- 6) Read Deuteronomy 32. How do you hear the summary of the Israelite story in this song? What do you learn of God's character compared to human character?

Additional Resources

Last week I referenced Sandra Richter's book Epic of Eden. She has a

chapter will help explain the impact of creating a covenant with God on the Israelite mentality and sense of identity.
